Message From The Chairman

As Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, it is my privilege to report that as we move into 2023, East Fallowfield Township is financially secure and well positioned to provide the ongoing public services that have been the hallmark of our community.

I also want to highlight that the Township provides a variety of important services that directly benefit our community including police and fire protection, snow removal, road maintenance, trash and recycling, yard waste collection, park maintenance, and recreational activities throughout the year. I'd like to thank our dedicated Township staff who have been able to maintain all operations and provide a high level of service with very limited resources.

No Increase in Real Estate Tax!

Despite the many economic challenges and heavy inflation experienced over the past three years, the Township has successfully maintained all levels of police, public works, fire, and emergency services, without an increase in real estate tax rates. Through careful management of Township operations, 2023 will be the fifth straight year with no property tax increase.

The real estate tax for East Fallowfield Township will remain at 3.0 mills for each \$1,000 of assessed property with no reduction of services to the Township. While we cannot promise that we can hold the line on Township taxes indefinitely, this trend is a result of East Fallowfield Township's strong financial leadership. The Township has also aggressively pursued state and federal grant funding rather than relying on tax revenues to pay for major capital projects. These grant revenues have been very beneficial to the Township finances.

Where Do My Property Taxes Go?

When you receive your property tax bill in the mail, keep in mind that your bill includes taxes from several taxing authorities, not just East Fallowfield Township. Many residents believe the township is responsible for high taxes, but only 6.2% of your annual real estate taxes are paid to East Fallowfield Township. The remaining 93.8% of your tax bill are collected for Chester County and the Coatesville Area School District (CASD). The Township does not have any control over these two separate taxing authorities.

As we move forward into the new year, I'd like to thank the township's staff for continuing to focus on new ways to provide high levels of service in the most financially responsible manner. Let's all continue to work hard to make East Fallowfield the best it can be!

From the Manager's Desk

Hello Residents of East Fallowfield. I hope everyone had a great winter and is looking forward to the spring! I am excited to announce that the Township will break ground on several park projects over the next several months.

New Gazebo Coming Soon...

Township residents and visitors will soon have a new gathering spot at the community park! We are currently finalizing plans to install a new octagon-shaped gazebo near the playground. While I anticipate the gazebo will be used for special events including our summer concerts, the gazebo will be conveniently placed near the playground so parents can watch their kids while relaxing in the shade.

The structure will be ADA-compliant so that individuals who use wheelchairs can enjoy the gazebo as well. The cost of the 36-foot metal gazebo structure will be approximately \$100,000, which includes labor to install the structure and a new concrete pad.

As the Township actively seeks grants to fund capital and infrastructure projects, the Township was able to secure a \$10,000 grant from the Brandywine Creek Greenway grant program to help fund the project. An additional grant application to the Chester County Preservation Partnership Grant Program is pending. The Township is exploring other opportunities to raise additional funding as well. The balance of the project will be come from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding.

Construction of the new structure is scheduled to begin in August.

'Bee' Ready for Buzzy

Our youngest park visitors will soon experience some extra "bounce" when they visit the community playground this summer. The Township is purchasing new playground equipment including a 'Buzzy the Bumblebee' spring rider. 'Buzzy' has already been ordered and is scheduled to arrive this summer.

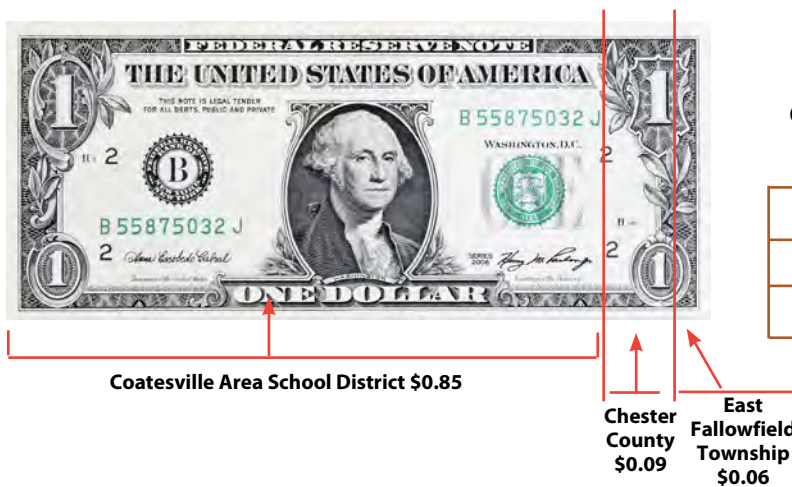

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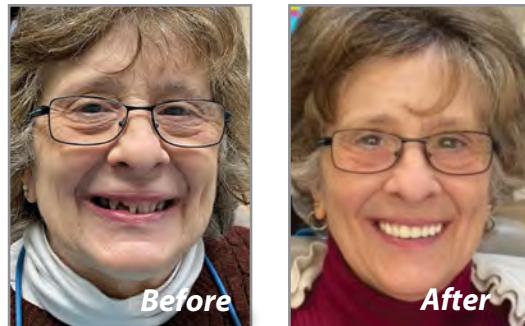


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East Fallowfield Township Welcomes New Police Chief

Chad Osborn was formally sworn in as East Fallowfield Township's newest Chief of Police during a ceremony attended by friends, family, East Fallowfield Township Police Officers, Aston Township Police Officers, and Township Supervisors at the township building on January 3.

Chief Osborn, a 25-year veteran of law enforcement, was introduced by Township Manager Scott Swichar and sworn in by Magisterial District Judge Nancy Gill. As the Chief of Police, Chief Osborn oversees five full-time police officers, one sergeant, three part-time police officers, and administrative staff.

During the swearing in ceremony, Jimmy Flynn of the Chester County Emerald Society played the bagpipes for the large crowd of attendees. Reverend Annalie Koregel also attended the swearing-in ceremony and delivered the invocation prayer. Chester County FOP Lodge President Bob McCarron formally welcomed Chief Osborn to Chester County.

Chief Osborn was chosen from among 23 candidates through a professional recruitment process conducted by the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association. "After an extensive search, Osborn stood out as an intelligent, highly respected and incredibly talented candidate who will continue evolving our police department," said Township Manager Scott Swichar.

He began his career in law enforcement in 1994 as a part-time police officer in Delaware County before moving on as a full-time police officer with the Aston Township Police Department, where he first served for nine years as a patrol officer before being promoted to the rank of Sergeant in 2005.

Chief Osborn is also an adjunct graduate professor at DeSales University as well as an instructor at Delaware County Community College Municipal Police Academy and Montgomery County Community College Municipal Police Academy.

Chief Osborn is a resident of Delaware County and received his Master of Arts degree in Criminal Justice from DeSales University. He attended Northwestern University's Center for Public Safety – School of Police Staff and Command.



Osborn said "East Fallowfield Township Police Department is highly respected in Chester County and throughout the state. I am proud and happy to be part of this team. I look forward to leading East Fallowfield Township Police Department into the future."

Crime Prevention Tips



In recent months, a number of East Fallowfield Township residents have experienced thefts from their motor vehicles in several of our developments. These crimes usually occur during the overnight hours and typically involve victims who have left their vehicles unlocked. There are several ways the community can assist the police department in combating these types of crimes.

First, we encourage our residents to "harden the target" by ensuring all vehicles are locked and alarmed, even if the vehicles are parked in the driveway. Second, we encourage our residents to remove all valuables from inside the vehicle, for example keys to the vehicle, computers, phones, money, and firearms. A firearm stolen from an unsecured vehicle can be employed criminally. Third, if you observe suspicious activity, please notify the police immediately by calling 911. The type of offenders for this crime can include local juveniles, addicted persons, or organized gang members.



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The Police At Your Service!

If you ever need to contact or visit the East Fallowfield Police Department, we want to make sure you have our information handy. Our station is located at 475 Doe Run Road in East Fallowfield. Please note that we are not located at the township building on Strasburg Road, even though we do receive mail there.

For all emergency situations anywhere in East Fallowfield Township, ALWAYS CALL 911. For non-emergency situations, contact the police by calling the Chester County Dispatch at 610-383-7000. The direct phone number to the East Fallowfield Police Station is 610-384-9163. The answering system directs you to the following choices:

- **PRESS #1** to leave a voice message for the on-duty patrol officer (note: voice messages may not be returned immediately if the officer on duty is responding to emergency calls.)
- **PRESS #3** to leave a voice message for the police Administrative Assistant (typically during normal business hours Monday through Friday)

- **PRESS #4** to leave a voice message for the Chief of Police
- **PRESS #5** to leave a tip on the Anonymous Tip Line
- **PRESS #7** to leave a voice message for an individual officer by last name (note: you might not receive a return call until that officer returns to shift)

All voice messages for individual officers will be forwarded to the officer's email for follow up. If you were involved in a motor vehicle crash and a police report was generated, you can visit CRASHDOCS.ORG with your accident date and police report number to get a copy of the report. Please stay safe, and please reach out if you need us.

East Fallowfield Township Buys First Hybrid Police Interceptor

The East Fallowfield Township Police Department has received its first hybrid Ford Police Interceptor vehicle. The purchase is the latest effort to reduce East Fallowfield's carbon footprint. According to Ford, a 2022 standard AWD Police Interceptor conserves an estimated 343 gallons of fuel annually when compared to a 2018 non-hybrid Police Interceptor.

The Board of Supervisors approved the purchase of the hybrid vehicle at their board meeting last year. "This vehicle has state-of-the-art technology that runs on a lithium-ion battery," said Police Chief Chad Osborn. "I am pleased that the East Fallowfield Township Police Department can play a role in our community's green future without compromising public safety," Osborn said.

According to a national study, the majority of police vehicles consume the greatest amount of fuel while idling. The hybrid configuration in the Ford Interceptor allows the engine to shut down without interrupting a steady supply of electricity to keep the vehicle's computers and communications devices working.

"This is an important next step as we evaluate the police department's fleet to ensure we are doing our part to achieve a zero-carbon footprint," said Township Manager Scott Swichar.

We're Planning For the Future, and We Need Your Help!

East Fallowfield Township is updating its outdated 1993 Open Space, Recreation and Environmental Resources Plan. As part of the process, the Township interviewed three planning consultants and selected Simone Collins, Inc. as the consultant to develop the new plan.

East Fallowfield Township is home to a community park, playground, and several open spaces. Each plays an important role in keeping East Fallowfield healthy, equitable, and sustainable. Ultimately, the plan will guide future work around these spaces.

"We are excited to begin the process of creating the updated plan, and encourage the community to participate and provide input, which will help us establish the plan's priorities," said Township Manager Scott Swichar. "Community feedback is an integral part of the planning process, and we look forward to engaging with as many residents as possible," Swichar said.

"Whether you live, work, study, or play in East Fallowfield, everyone will have something to offer this process. Throughout the next several months, our community members will have various opportunities to get involved and help shape our approach to parks and open spaces for the next 7-10 years," concluded Swichar.

The project has been funded in part by a \$30,000 grant from the Chester County Vision Partnership Program (VPP).

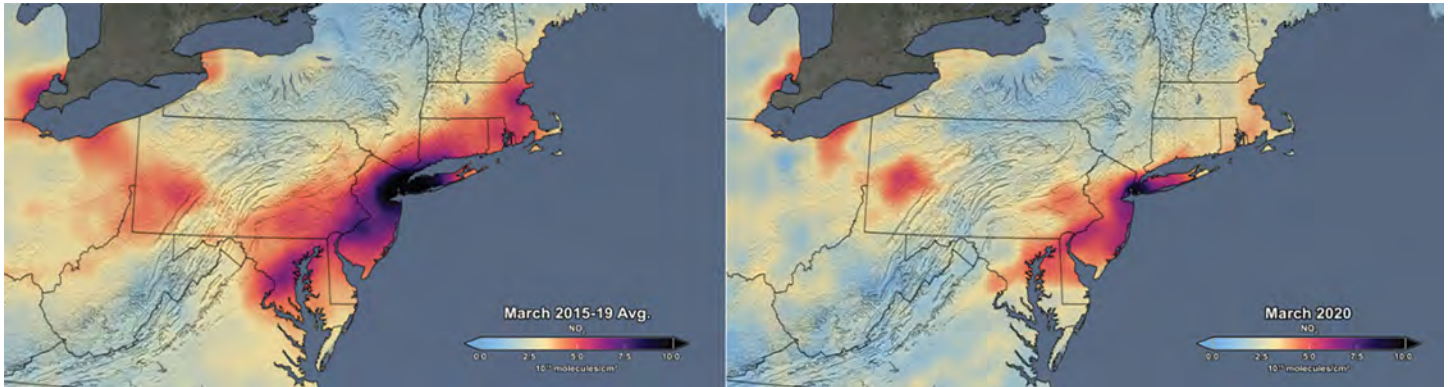

Environmental Advisory Committee Update

Did you know there was over a 30% decrease in air pollution in the Eastern U.S. in March 2020 compared to levels during the months of March 2015-2019? This was mainly the result of less travel and reduced burning of fossil fuels. Our Township's Environmental Advisory Council has performed a Green House Gas Inventory of East Fallowfield to quantify the amount of these pollutants that we generate. We can make our Township look more like the picture on the right by transitioning to clean sustainable energy for transportation and residential heating, cooling, and electricity.

Right now, the Inflation Reduction Act is providing incentives to residents for purchasing electric vehicles and installing solar, wind, and geothermal systems, see links below. By taking advantage of these incentives, we can reduce our dependence on fossil fuels and eliminate the pollution they generate. The Township is currently drafting an Action Plan consistent with County and State plans to transition to clean renewable energy.

IRS Inflation Reduction Act

Inflation Reduction Act Provides Tax Credits and Funding for Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy Projects

The Inflation Reduction Act is billed as the most significant action related to climate change ever taken by the US Congress. It was signed into law in 2022 and went into effect on January 1 of this year. In addition to billions in spending for vaccines, prescription drugs, and other medical subsidies, it includes \$370 billion for energy efficiency and clean energy projects that homeowners, businesses, non-profits, and governments can take advantage of.

tips for stormwater management on your property

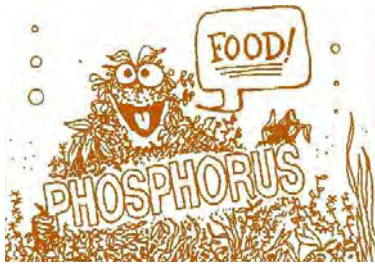
DID YOU KNOW:

- Fertilizers contain nitrogen and phosphorus which wash or leach into our streams and ponds.
- Even small levels of these nutrients can overload ponds or streams, and result in undesirable weed and algae growth. Algae depletes oxygen, killing fish and limiting the diversity of what lives in our streams.

To minimize the impact of lawn fertilization on our streams:

1 Fertilize in the fall.

Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection discourages spring application of fertilizer because it creates excessive top growth of grass. DEP recommends instead that homeowners **fertilize lawns around Labor Day** and use a second application in late October if needed. Fall fertilization promotes vigorous root growth and prevents fertilizer from leaching into streams and ponds in the spring.



2 Do a soil test and consider phosphorus-free fertilizers.

Phosphorus is typically the limiting nutrient in algae growth. If your phosphorus levels are already adequate, select a phosphorus-free fertilizer. If your property drains to a stream, pond, or reservoir, do not use phosphate fertilizers. Mail-in soil test kits are available from your County Extension Service.



3 Use slow-release and organic alternatives.

Select fertilizers with "slow-release" forms of nitrogen which release more slowly into the soil and are less likely to leach. Choose organic rather than chemical-based fertilizers.

4 Limit application amounts to designated levels, and recycle grass clippings.

Lawns typically require 2.5 - 3 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet per year. Recycling grass clippings on your lawn can meet between 25% and 50% of nitrogen needs.



5 Avoid stream edges and stormwater conveyances.

Do not fertilize stormwater basins, or drainage swales leading to basins, or within 25 feet of stormwater basins or streams.
